






## Ty's Ride

Ty loved going to car shows, cruise-ins & doing burnouts. His parents are now the keepers of the car and wish to keep his memory alive by sharing it with all of you!



the Forest Hill Moose Lodge on February 25th. Dave Bielecki invited Mike and Bonnie Frances from the Cruisers for Christ to open the breakfast with prayer. Then he invited the club representatives to mention their coming events. Dave, publisher of the bi-monthly magazine, along with considerable help, has put this breakfast on so the car clubs can get together and share their ideas and information. All of this with little compensation. Doug

Wood, Director of the Custom and Classis Car Educational Assistance Foundation stands next to the new magazine front cover. The new theme at the bottom of the page reads "Dedicated to the Saving the Hobby". This will appear on all future front covers. Doug also works for Taylor Sheridan, Paramount, and is instrumental in moving autos for TV and movie productions. If you have a vehicle that you might be interested in having appear in some type of entertainment, contact him.

Kevin Hornberger, Cecil County Maryland House of Delegates and Sema National Chairman, spoke to the recent legislation concerning "Historic" tagged vehicles. According to Kevin, only factory emission/exhaust will be legal and vehicles 1986 and newer will need to pass emissions tests and vehicle inspections. The Historic Tag issue, i.e. 20 years and older, is being abused and our legislators want it stopped. With the number of catalytic converters

being stolen and the industries lack of replacements, this will make it impossible to stay within the law. Another topic was the "Right to Repair' legislation that endeavors to allow the people, who bought and paid for a vehicle, to make their own repairs rather than incur dealer expense. He also addressed the issue of stolen front tags. Addressing the politians desire to fill our highways with electric vehicles, Rep. Hornberger noted that presently, less that 2% hybrid or electric and it will likely take

thirty years to approach that threat.

Ron Yeager of Ron's Rods, located in Kingsville, MD. has the saying, "If it's metal, we can fix it". Ron conducts apprenticeship classes in metal work. He has 14 to 20 year-old young men now learning the trade

when they can, and twice a year he has a group of professionals spend a weekend working on a project that can be attended by any interested person. Doug Wood commented that unless we get more young folks interested in this craft, the hobby is doomed

**J.D. Kurzmann of Kurzmann's Auto Brokerage** made us aware of the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) problem that most



of us overlook. VIN's are often incorrect with letters and number missing or wrong. Another hint, if you have a loan release attach it to the title so it doesn't get lost. Also, it is possible to get a "Title Plate"

made that will suffice a missing number when the vehicle is sold. This is an especially good idea with vehicles older than the 1950's. Early antiques cars often had no number at all.





# 2023 Auction Season Up and Running with Carlisle Auctions in Lakeland, Florida

# \$4 Million in Sales and Over 200 Lots Sold Bring Car Lovers Together From Florida and Beyond

LAKELAND, FL – Carlisle Auctions will run over 1,600 lots across the auction block in 2023, and its season of automotive excitement recently commenced by way of a two-day event in Lakeland, Florida. The Lakeland Winter Collector Car Auction took place at the SUN 'n FUN Expo Campus February 10-11, 2023, and in doing so, brought buyers, sellers, and spectators alike together for \$4 million in total sales, money raised for charity, and live automotive excitement outdoors amongst airplanes, palm trees, and sunny skies. As mentioned, the auction garnered \$4 million in sales with 50% of all committed consignments selling. This data exceeds last year's Lakeland February totals. In addition, a nice mix of lots staked claim to "Top 4" distinction. Those four, a 1970 Plymouth Barracuda (\$86,400), 1968 Chevy Camaro (\$78,440), 1966 Cadillac Eldorado (\$77,145), and 1965 Chevrolet Corvette (\$72,000) accounted for nearly \$400,000 of the \$4 million total. The Camaro was the top-selling lot for Friday, while the Barracuda was not only the top sale for Saturday, but for the auction as a whole.

In addition to the cars that crossed the block, the popular All-Truck Hour returned on Friday, February 11 at 1:30 p.m. 25 trucks crossed the block during this time with 20 of them finding new homes. Overall, this hour was the strongest performing of any time slot spanning two days. Lots ranged from standard trucks, to Jeeps, SUVs, and even a VW Van. Carlisle Auctions also helped sell a vehicle for charity. The lots came to the event by way of Steve Muschlitz and Wheels from the Heart. The sale of a 1992 Jaguar garnered \$2,600

for Wheels from the Heart. Wheels from the Heart is a Delray Beach, Florida-based organization that provides road-worthy transportation to single mothers in need and this sale offers a nice boost for them and their cause. "Thank you to all of the buyers and sellers that made this a great start to our auction year," noted Director of Auction Operations, Tony Cline. "We are looking

forward to our Spring Carlisle Collector Car Auction in April in Carlisle PA. We're actively accepting consignments and bidder registration. We can't wait to see you at Carlisle for this great event.

Finally, Carlisle Auctions reminds everyone that its next offering is in just over one month as part of the Spring Carlisle Collector Car Swap Meet and Corral. Spring Carlisle itself runs April 19-23, while the auction is April 20-21. As noted by Cline, the opportunity to get involved with the auction is open and ongoing. #### Jay Kirschner's 1966 Chevy Nova Wagon

This is one of those "Bought not Built" projects that turned into a building project. Jay has always wanted a Chevy II coupe, but when he saw the wagon for sale in York, PA he had to have it. The original build was done in Huntington Beach, CA by Wheelers Customs and the interior by Westminster Auto Upholstery. These 2 builders have unheard of hours in



making the wagon straighter than straight which is incredible to see on a black paint job. There are many modifications that were over the top as well. The door handles, mirrors, wipers, window quarter, vent windows, and window cranks have all been deleted, the bumpers are pinched in, turn signals moved into the headlights, gas tank relocated to hide behind the drivers taillight, tilted rear lights, and electric windows all around. Bonus is on those hot days you can turn on the A/C and have the windows down thanks to the Vintage Air system. The interior is ivory leather with black





inserts over Lexus electronic seats. Over the winter the seats are headed to "The Dye Guy" to get some much needed TLC. The headliner matches the seats in ultra suede leather.

We have been in contact with the amazing men that were hands on with this build and it's been awesome to learn everything about the 5 year build. We have put our hours in on making

some changes as well. There is a new RideTech Air ride system, upgraded the engine to a 383 Stroker, had Richard Glymph and team put some hours in repainting the single stage paint job, redesigned the exhaust while adding a pair of Super10's.

I can go on and on, but honestly the greatest gift that this car has brought us is friendship. We have met some of the greatest people while cruising around. This "hobby" has us planning out our weekends based on what parking lot or patch of grass we are going to park in.



the way. With over 600 hours in muralling alone, there was a lot of story to share and driving the van a total of over 5,000 miles, we would have a lot of people to share the story with.

Our road trip began from our home in Central PA, taking I-81 South to I-40 West with a destination of Nevada. Our first goal was to 'just get there' and though we saw some amazing country on the way, we stayed the 2700 mile course without many stops. However, we recommend more frequent stops to minimize driver strangulation, (lol). The Dragonlord

behaved as it roared on down the road. There were many thumbs up, honking of horns and vehicles flanking us to get some great photos.

As we got closer to Nevada at a fill up in Texas, we met up with a former vanner whose nickname, not kidding, was 'Beard'. 






#### **Roger Pritt**



# Collector's Zone with Andy Goodman



I spend much of my column time sharing with collectors the new die cast products that are coming to market, however, in this issue we are going to take a different direction. Over the past several months I have been approached by countless collectors asking me how to best protect their vast collection. All that time and money spent hunting for the right collectibles that suits one's style. Thousands, tens-of-thousands, hundreds-of-thousands invested over time - yet have you ever sat down and read the fine print of your homeowner or renters' insurance policy as to what is and is not covered in detail should you face the total loss of your home.

Should you experience a devastating Fire or Flood – if something happens to your home out of your control, what does that mean to your destroyed collectibles? Most collectors don't realize, that if ever in the position of a total loss, their collections are not replaced, nor costs recovered, because the maximum internal content allowance was already fully allocated by the provide.

Let's discuss ways to make sure you don't end up on the short end of the stick, ever. First off if you have a homeowners or renters policy discuss with you carrier the possibility of adding additional "stated value" interior asset coverage to your policy. Depending on the amount of additional coverage you decide on as necessary will determine the cost, but this is a simple, easy, and effective way protect yourself. This also allows you to split up the cost of the coverage over the year by rolling the additional expense into your monthly mortgage payment, so you don't feel the pinch at once each year. Another option is to purchase a separate policy from a

specialty company such as American Collectors Insurance (www.americancollectors.com/insurance/collectibles/toys/) and or (www.collectand-protect.com/insurance/collection) both long standing firms that offer "Agreed Value Coverage" which does not require a piece by piece log and appraisal.

It is also a good idea, though not a requirement by most insurance companies, to log your collection be it by the old school system of a paper and pen or make a digital record. When you have gathered a rather extensive collection you should have documentation to share with your insurance provider just in case a discrepancy

does pop up. Remember insurance is a business and they want to pay out as little as they must, so any documentation helps. If you are protected and prepared properly you will put yourself in the best possible position, should you be faced with an uncontrollable and unfortunate situation.




